In reflecting on our work and impact in 2022, I immediately think of the exceptional people that make United Way of South Texas a leader in health and human services. I am grateful for every member of this inspiring Live United movement-from our Board of Directors, corporate, education, nonprofit and civic partners, to our first-time and longtime investors, individuals, volunteers and staff. Many families, including the elderly, struggled with the effects of inflation, as prices increased rapidly for nearly every basic necessity. The overwhelming change of ten resulted in mental health crisis. Throughout this period, United Way continued to collaborate with partners to drive the continued to collaborate with the continued to continue the continued to collaborate with the collaborate wimpact. Some of the work included investments in our Education Council, to fund emergency grants to support basic needs that became challenging to secure, including: clothing, prescription discount cards, transportation, school supplies and food baskets. Additionally, United Way expanded youth mentorship programs that offered students support groups, literacy projects and after-school youth programs. Thousands of families also benefited from free tax preparation services through the VITA program, allowing them to save and claim much needed benefits.

IMPACT IN 2022

United Way of South Texas funds over 100 programs that impact the Health, Education, Financial Stability and Safety Net of Hidalgo and Starr County families. We are the only local organization with the capacity to impact individuals from birth to end of life, resulting in the most impactful non-profit footprint in our two-county service area. Thanks to supporters, over 175,000 residents in Hidalgo and Starr Counties benefited from a United Way funded program in 2022.

EDUCATION

Youth Leadership Mentorship Program

The United Way's Youth Leadership Mentorship Program empowers Juniors and Freshmen with leadership skills, soft skills, volunteer opportunities and financial literacy training. Counselors identify Freshmen to participate as mentees and Juniors volunteer as mentors. In the past four years, 501 students have participated from the following school districts: Weslaco I.S.D., Mercedes I.S.D., McAllen I.S.D., and Sharyland I.S.D.



Education Council

The Education Council is represented by eight school districts (Edcouch-Elsa I.S.D., La Joya I.S.D., McAllen I.S.D., Mercedes I.S.D., Monte Alto I.S.D., Rio Grande City Grulla I.S.D., Roma I.S.D., and Weslaco I.S.D.). Social workers identify crucial needs of students in drop-out recovery programs, administer UW funded emergency grants and food pantries. An estimated 8,800 food baskets were distributed in 2022 to help families prepare healthy meals.

Back to School "In Style" Shopping Spree

150 middle school students from 16 school districts return to school "In Style". United Way awards the same opportunity to participating districts in Hidalgo and Starr Counties on a rotating basis. Students receive \$125 worth of school clothing and personal hygiene items. Target donates backpacks with school supplies. Over 200 UW supporters from companies that run United Way Employee Campaigns volunteer as "Shopping Buddies".

MORE THAN \$280,000 INVESTED

to purchase essential supplies for students, to allow them to succeed in school.

MORE THAN 2,161 STUDENTS

have participated in the program and started the school year with proper clothing and hygiene items that allow them to focus on learning.

MORE THAN 30,975 UNITS OF SUPPLIES

were distributed to middle school students in 2022 including: jeans, shoes, shirts, personal hygiene items, backpacks, school supplies and other back-to-school products.

Day of Caring - Project "FreshStart"

United Way launched Project "FreshStart" in 2011 to provide school supplies for high school Freshmen in an effort to reduce the drop-out rate. Since the start of United Way's Project "FreshStart" program, UW has invested \$276,308 in students and has helped 32,200 families in Hidalgo and Starr Counties. An estimated 645,900 units of school supplies were distributed in 2022.

UW Administers Programs that Leverage Support for Hundreds of Local Non-profits

Emergency Food & Shelter Program (EFSP)

Administered the distribution of over \$2,594,186 in federal funds for food and shelter programs in Hidalgo, Starr and Zapata Counties. EFSP designations vary annually depending on federal funding availability.

State Employee Charitable Campaign (SECC)

Managed employee giving campaign for RGV State employees. Raised \$118,400 during the 2022 Campaign.

FINANCIAL STABILITY

Latina Hope

A collaboration with the McAllen Chamber of Commerce and Wells Fargo, that offered business development classes

to support minority women entrepreneurs, with an interest in establishing or expanding microbusinesses in Hidalgo County. Along with attending educational sessions about creating business plans and financial literacy, participants benefitted from the emotional support and relationships that they built throughout the years. E-commerce business grants were also funded during the pandemic and many continue to thrive. Approximately fifty women participated on an annual basis.

HEALTH & SAFETY NET

Transportation Vouchers

United Way of South Texas distributes transportation vouchers at no cost to eligible clients through local non-profits. \$93,584 was invested from 2018-2022. United Way partners with the City of McAllen - Metro McAllen, to provide transportation to clients who are eligible for the vouchers. Some of the program partners include: McAllen I.S.D.; McAllen Housing Authority; Tropical TX Behaviorial Health; Endeavors (Veterans); and TX Workforce Solutions.

Single Rx Cards

United Way and Single Care collaborate to provide free prescription discount cards that require no enrollment or activation. Eligible clients, insured and uninsured, save an average of 42% on their medications. 6,152 families saved \$340,649 in 2022.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program - VITA

The VITA program has been administered by United Way of South Texas for over 12 years. The program is an IRS initiative that is designed to provide free income tax preparation services to families with household incomes of less than \$60,000 in Hidalgo and Starr Counties. Over 130 IRS-trained and advanced certified volunteers, including high school students, college students and retired professionals, participate in the VITA program. United Way tax preparation services are available to eligible clients year-round.

MORE THAN \$5.7 MILLION IN TAX RETURNS

were alloted to VITA clients in the 2022 tax season. VITA ensures that taxpayers receive the maximum tax credits and deductions they may be eligible for.

MORE THAN \$780,000 SAVED

in tax preparation fees. Families on average, spend more than \$300 in tax preparation fees. Savings and refunds are reinvested into our local economy and help families fund major expenses.

MORE THAN 2,600 INDIVIDUALS

and approximately 5,200 family members used VITA, whether it was in person, virtually or on their own by accessing My-FreeTaxes.com. VITA operates at 17 locations across Hidalgo & Starr Counties.

Starr County Support Programs

United Way funds various programs in Starr County that provide basic necessities for the elderly and disabled; medical assistance to impoverished families, food pantries and much more. Parents receive books for their newborns to introduce them to and encourage reading in the home.

Spirit of Christmas

A collaboration between United Way and The Monitor to help families during the holidays. School representatives identify students and families with the most need. Reporters from The Monitor then visit with the families and write stories, which may deal with illness, loss of a home

or family members, and other extenuating circumstances. The program has been administered by UW staff and volunteers for nineteen years, and has impacted approximately 1,346 individuals.
